

1. IMPROVING ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

- Listening/Speaking Skills
- Analytical Skills in English

The language instruction program emphasizes improved understanding of spoken English and using oral English in informal social situations. Reading and writing skills are integrated into the program as a complement to the development of oral skills.

Daily class activities use highly interactive and communicative methods to give students opportunities to develop both spoken fluency and increase their comprehension of the spoken language. The emphasis is on oral English in “real life” situations which students are likely to need in international encounters.



2. CULTURAL UNDERSTANDING, RESEARCH & PRESENTATION

- American values and institutions
 - Research Skills
 - Presentation Skills

Students learn about core American values and institutions, such as academic freedom, educational systems, and volunteer organizations. In addition, they practice academic research and writing skills, with special attention to sharpening critical thinking skills and avoiding plagiarism. Finally, students polish their English proficiency and public-speaking skills through speeches, small group discussions and group presentations.

3. FIELDWORK & INTERACTIVE ACTIVITIES

- Visit Hawaii’s landmark
- Interact with others in real world settings

Some assignments send participants to sites of historical and educational importance, where they must first interact with local residents by asking questions or conducting short interviews, and then writing a paragraph on their experiences. Participants thus have the opportunity to engage in real-world settings and to interact with other speakers of English, and get the chance for direct feedback from their instructors.



4. ENHANCING ENGLISH & INTELLECT VIA HUMANISM

- Read, think and discuss
- Selected readings from Humanism course

Intended for students to enrich English “Chasing Excellence” by (1) reading; (2) thinking; and (3) discussing/presenting. Students will be equipped to be more imaginative and inspirational giving rise to CREATIVITY. “Chase Excellence” and “Be Jobs” (our hope is for students to become like Steve Jobs).

5. EXPERIENCE AMERICAN CLASSROOMS & INTERACT WITH UH STUDENTS

Students will explore their major and other interested subjects by observing classes at the University of Hawaii. By sitting in classes, students test how well they understand English lectures. It’s a valuable time to experience the American classroom atmosphere.

Most importantly, students will have the chance to interact with other students from the University of Hawaii. Our wish is that students return home with two good friends, and continue getting in touch with them even after returning home.



6. SPECIAL LECTURES BY NOTED SCHOLARS

- Inspiring talks / Stories of success
- Philosophy of life / Global perspectives

Hear special lectures by noted scholars from various backgrounds. Students will be exposed to success stories and philosophies which will inspire them and broaden their global perspectives.

Accommodations

Housing accommodations will be provided at the East-West Center Lincoln Hall for program participants at a special rate of \$35.00 per person at Studio Rooms on a double occupancy basis as number of participants permit.

When a double occupancy at studio rooms cannot be made or the number of applicants exceeds the number of rooms reserved (20 persons maximum on double occupancy basis), alternate occupancy arrangement may be made such as (1) East-West Center Dormitory on a double or single occupancy basis at \$35 per night (cost remains the same regardless); or (2) home stay arrangements if it can be arranged (cost remains the same regardless).

Lincoln Hall provides hotel-style service. Studio Rooms are furnished with a refrigerator, T.V., telephone, and private bath/shower. Clean towels are provided and rooms are cleaned daily.

Lincoln Hall is located on the campus of the University of Hawaii at Manoa. The majority of residents are visiting scholars and short-term conference participants. The reception desk provides check-in and check-out services. The desk also takes messages, provides change for laundry and vending machines, issues spare keys, and provides general information.

**Please be advised that you will pay a single occupancy rate in the event that a roommate cannot be arranged.*

1. CAPE English Language Program Application Form (Form 1)
2. Signed Responsibility and Release Form (Form 4)
3. Deposit of \$1,655 (\$850 for tuition + \$100 non-refundable registration fee + \$665 for accommodations + \$40 for textbook)
4. Bank statement of availability of sufficient funds to cover your intended length of stay (minimum \$1,800 for 3 weeks) (The I-20 Form will be issued only for the length of time for which financial support is guaranteed.)
5. Financial statement (Form 2)
6. Statement of Financial Responsibility (if supported by parents or other sponsor - Form 3)

To receive an acceptance letter only (as visitor/tourist visa)**

1. CAPE English Language Program Application Form (Form 1)
2. Signed Responsibility and Release Form (Form 4)
3. Deposit of \$1,655 (\$850 for tuition + \$100 non-refundable registration fee + \$665 for accommodations + \$40 for textbook)

* *Full-time student - 20 hours a week (full-time study of 20 hours a week requires an F-1 student visa)*

** *Part-time student - less than 18 hours per week*

Medical Insurance

All students are required to have medical and emergency repatriation insurance to cover the period of time they will be in the United States. This insurance should be purchased before departure in the student's home country. All students will be required to show proof of such coverage before they begin classes in Hawaii.

THE CENTER FOR ASIA-PACIFIC EXCHANGE (CAPE), a non-profit, educational institution, was established in Honolulu, Hawaii in November 1980. 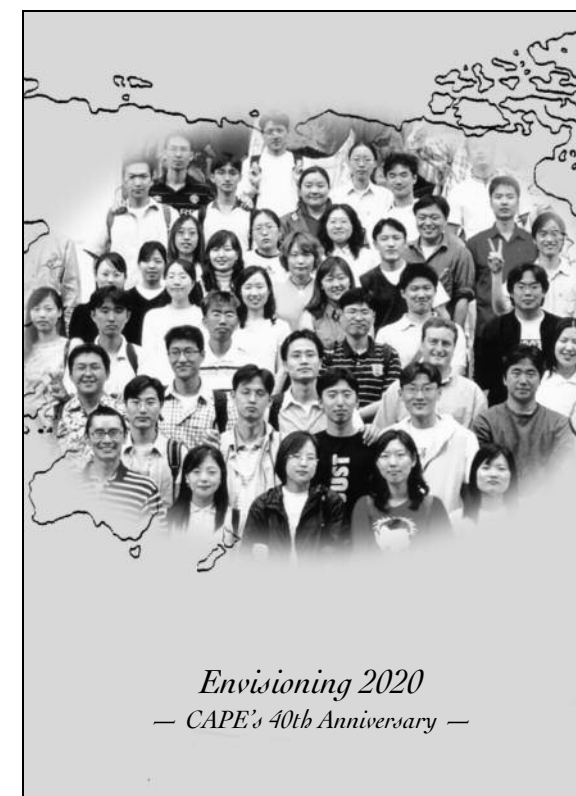
